

Annual Village Meeting Reports 15th May 2025

Report by the Parish Council Chairman

This report covers the period from April 2024 to March 2025

The Council has had a full complement of Councillors for the year. However, at the time of writing, there is one vacancy as Councillor Tim Bryant has decided to step down. The Parish Council wishes to thank Tim for his input over many years, firstly as Chair of the Planning Committee and lately as Deputy Chair of the full Council. Tim has served the village well, bringing plenty of experience and knowledge to the Council and he will be missed.

We have had a challenging time with the departure of two Parish Clerks in the last twelve months. Sam Adeniji resigned in June 2024 and then we had two months assistance from Julia Shelley as Locum. We were delighted to welcome Fiona Chalk as our Clerk and Responsible Finance Officer in August but unfortunately Fiona has had to step down in March due to family circumstances. Julia Shelley has returned as our Locum and I am pleased to say that at the time of producing this report we are in the process of appointing a new Clerk. More news to follow at the Annual Village Meeting.

We welcomed three new Councillors in May 2024 who are Naomi Baker, Jonathan Greenway and Trevor Larkin

All Councillor's attend the main Council and Planning meetings. Cllr. Grant Fowler, Cllr Naomi Baker and Cllr. David White also serve on the Neighbourhood Plan Steering Committee.

The Council are indebted to the continued support and assistance from Mr David George, our Hon Solicitor, and regular helpers Graham Street (Bus Shelters, Speed Camera and Flag Master) and Jan Smith (Pavillion Caretaker). Ron Franklin has moved from the village and he was known for cleaning the bus shelters on the A259 in East Dean and Friston. The Council is to place a plaque on one of the new benches at East Dean bus stop in thanks to Ron for all of his hard work.

Highlights over the last 12 months include:

- Finances are healthy and the precept for 2024 / 25 was set at £77,175, up from £73,500 last year. However, this equates to £1.52 a week for a Band D property which is excellent value.
- The Parish Council has been left a bequest by a resident of the village of £25,000 which will be put towards a suitable project in due course.
- We continue to cut grass at The Greensward, Village Green, around Friston Pond and various open spaces and maintain the many public bins and footpaths around the village.
- Electric Vehicle charging points have been installed in the village car park courtesy of Wealden District Council.
- Various trees have been lopped in the village public areas.
- New benches have been installed at bus stops on the A259 in the village.
- Replacement of the defibrillators at the shops, Michel Dene Road, Village Hall and the Cricket Pavillion.
- The bus shelters have had replacement glazing installed where required.
- Celebration of D Day on 6th June at the recreation ground.
- Grants have been made to various organisations in the village and also to the RNLI and Beachy Head Chaplaincy.
- We continue to work with the Roads Company and the Residents Association on the private estate.
- We have applied to East Sussex County Council for a Road Traffic Order to introduce a 20mph speed limit in Upper Street, Lower Street, Went Way and all of the private estate roads north of the A259.
- The Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group has had a very productive year and further details will be given at the meeting.

Planning remains a priority for the Parish and there have been 22 applications this year which is lower than in previous years. 29 in 2023/24, 44 in 2022/23 and 48 in 2021/22. The Parish Council recommended approval in 16 cases (two with conditions) and these were accepted by the South Downs National Park. In a further 4 cases the Council did object but these were approved by South Downs National Park.

Plans for 2025 / 26 will include:

- Progression of the Neighbourhood Plan to a successful conclusion including a referendum on the plan voted on by all villagers. This will also deliver some new policies for the Council to take forward.
- Progress of the 20mph speed limit proposals.
- Review of the Cricket Pavilion, Tennis Court and other facilities at the Recreation Ground. Any development proposals will be brought to a public meeting in due course for consideration.
- V.E. Day 80th Anniversary celebration at the Recreation Ground on the evening of Thursday 8th June 2025 including lighting of the beacon.
- Continued maintenance and improvement to all Council owned assets.
- Installation of a defibrillator at Friston.

- Challenge ESCC regarding Exceat Bridge replacement proposals.
- Liaise with Wealden District Council, East Sussex County Council and Government on the proposed Devolution Bill and the introduction of Unitary Authorities and Mayors and the impact this may have on the Parish.
- 25 Year Celebration of the Village Hall and Village Awards evening on Saturday 4th October.

The Parish Council will continue to play an active role in the village and do our best to ensure that the voice of villagers who raise valid concerns are addressed wherever possible.

Proposal for the East Dean & Friston Community Sports and Social Club

Summary

The East Dean & Friston Community Sports and Social Club (The Club) aims to create a vibrant facility that would cater to the recreational and social needs of local residents. By improving and enhancing the existing pavilion and introducing new amenities, the Club would enable the future viability of local sports clubs, foster community spirit, promote inclusivity, and address concerns such as loneliness and mental health. This proposal outlines the vision, facilities, funding strategies, and potential benefits of establishing this community asset. The Village meeting on May 15th at East Dean Village Hall serves as a platform for local residents to engage with the project and provide their feedback.

1. Introduction

East Dean & Friston Cricket Club (EDFCC) supports the initiative to develop a new Community Sports and Social Club that would serve the diverse needs of our village. It is important to note that this project will be promoted by an independent body representing all stakeholders, including the Bowls Club, the Parish Council, residents and all stakeholders, rather than solely by EDFCC. The aim is to create a collaborative environment that benefits all residents.

2. Proposed Features and Facilities

2.1. Facilities

The proposed Club would include the following key facilities:

- Cricket Pavilion: An upgraded pavilion that would accommodate changing rooms, showers, and social spaces.
- **Relocated Bowls Green**: The Bowls Green could be situated in the southwest corner of the recreation ground, providing easy access to all facilities and ensuring Bowls players can fully participate in Club activities.
- Multi-Sport Facilities: Refurbished tennis courts which can be used as cricket nets and for basketball / netball, all located on the same existing site. Provision of tennis coaching.
- **Social Spaces**: A bar, café, and casual seating areas would foster social interaction and community events.
- Public Toilets: Accessible facilities for visitors, ensuring a comfortable experience.
- Remote Working Facilities: Designated areas equipped with power outlets and seating
 for residents to work on laptops, promoting a productive environment for those who
 wish to work remotely.

2.2. Addressing Community Concerns

Common objections to new community projects often include concerns about noise, traffic, and financial sustainability. To address these:

- **Noise Management**: We would implement sound insulation measures and restrict use during late hours to minimise disturbances.
- **Traffic Control**: A comprehensive parking and traffic management plan would be developed in collaboration with local authorities to ensure safe access and egress.
- **Financial Viability**: The Club would generate income through membership fees, rental of facilities, and hosting events, ensuring long-term sustainability.

3. Community Benefits

3.1. Fostering Community Spirit

The Club would serve as a hub for social interaction, helping to combat loneliness, especially among the elderly and single residents. By hosting events, activities, and youth programmes, we would create an inclusive environment that strengthens community ties.

3.2. Supporting Local Sports

EDFCC's strategy includes promoting youth involvement and female participation in cricket. This initiative would align with the England and Wales Cricket Board's (ECB) mandate for future support and funding, ensuring that we stay competitive and relevant.

3.3. Collaboration with the Bowls Club

Relocating the Bowls Club to this site would make it more accessible for elderly and disabled members, enhancing their participation and sense of community. The additional members from the Bowls Club would contribute to the financial sustainability of the facility, creating a more robust community asset.

3.4. Economic Advantages

The facility would also stimulate the local economy by:

- Providing rental income from events and classes.
- Attracting independent businesses, such as a café or wellness centre.
- Creating job opportunities for facility management and coaching.

4. Environmental Sustainability

We are committed to implementing best practices in environmental sustainability throughout the design and operation of the Community Sports and Social Club. Key features would include:

- **Solar Panels**: The installation of solar panels on the roof would generate electricity for the Club and provide power for electric vehicle (EV) charging stations, promoting clean energy use.
- Rainwater Recycling and Storage: A rainwater harvesting system would be implemented to collect and store rainwater for irrigation of the cricket and bowls clubs, promoting efficient water use and sustainability.
- **Sustainable Building Materials**: The construction would use sustainable materials to minimise environmental impact and enhance the building's longevity.
- Accessibility: The facility would be designed with accessible entry and exit points, ensuring ease of use for individuals with low mobility, creating an inclusive environment for all community members.
- **Architectural Aesthetics**: The design of the facility would be visually stunning and in keeping with local heritage, with an emphasis on creating a space that could win awards for architectural excellence.

5. Collaboration and Governance

To effectively manage the development of the Club, we propose establishing an independent trust responsible for overseeing planning, fundraising, and operations. This body would ensure that the facility meets the community's needs while maintaining transparency and accountability.

5.1. Stakeholder Engagement

We would actively involve local residents, clubs, and organisations in the planning process to ensure that their voices are heard. Regular meetings, surveys, and feedback sessions would be conducted to refine our vision.

6. Funding Strategies

Securing funding is essential for the success of this project. We plan to pursue various sources:

- **Grants**: Applications to the National Lottery, ECB, Sport England, and other relevant organisations would be prioritised.
- **Fundraising Initiatives**: Local events and sponsorship opportunities would be organised to raise funds.
- **Legacies**: Encouraging residents to leave legacies dedicated to the Club would provide ongoing financial support.

7. Design Specification

7.1. Proposed Features

The design would encompass:

- **Ground Floor**: A fully equipped kitchen, bar, social seating for casual interaction, and changing facilities compliant with ECB guidelines.
- **Second Floor**: Spaces for physical activities, a balcony for relaxation, and potential rental areas for local businesses.

7.2. Community Engagement Spaces

The Club would feature areas specifically designed for community events, workshops, and social gatherings, ensuring that it serves as a welcoming and versatile space for all residents.

8. Conclusion

The East Dean & Friston Community Sports and Social Club represents an exciting opportunity to enhance the quality of life and social and physical fabric of our village. By addressing community needs, fostering collaboration, promoting inclusivity, and committing to environmental sustainability, this project would become a valued asset for all residents. We look forward to hearing your feedback at the Village meeting on May 15th and working together to bring this vision to life.

East Dean & Friston Cricket Club: Our Vision for the Future

East Dean & Friston Cricket Club (EDFCC) is on a mission to establish itself as the most welcoming village cricket club in the local area. With a comprehensive strategy and a five-year plan, we are committed to enhancing our club experience for all members while fostering a strong community spirit.

Enjoyable Cricket for All

Bus Service 41

Cuckmere Buses runs a fleet of 16-seater minibuses throughout the Cuckmere Valley area and beyond. It is run entirely by volunteers, there are no employees. There are over 40 fully trained drivers and 8 additional volunteers who all help run the fleet and keep the wheels turning.

The **East Dean and Friston shopping Service 41** runs twice weekly - on a **Tuesday and Thursday** per the timetable below. The Parish Council kindly sponsors the service. The bus will stop anywhere around the villages it is safe to do so – just raise your arm when you see the bus approaching or ring the bell if you are a passenger and wish to alight. It's like a taxi service but without the related cost; it's the easier, more friendly way into Eastbourne and home again that's practically door-to-door. Use your concessionary pass or pay the driver - cash or contactless. (The maximum single journey fare on all our services is capped at £3 until the end of 2025).

East Dean Downlands (Roads) Ltd

EDDR is a not-for-profit private limited company. It was set up in March 1984 with the prime objective of looking after the maintenance of the private roads and gulleys on the East Dean Downlands Estate. These activities were taken over from the previous owners after the roads had fallen into a poor state of repair, and this was followed by the legal transfer of appropriate covenants and enforcement rights to EDDR.

The roads are classified as 'private streets' meaning they are public highways with public rights of way. However, as the roads are not adopted by the Highways Authority (ESCC), they need to be privately maintained. That is where EDDR comes in. Although we do not own any of the roads, we arrange for the road maintenance, including resurfacing, pothole repairs, and gully and drain clearances. We operate in partnership with the Estate residents – we do not have a stated duty to maintain the roads but a right to do so, and an expectation from the residents that we will indeed maintain them.

We are funded by annual receipts from residents on the Estate. For 2025 the fee is a modest £125 per household, noticeably less than some other private estates. The fee is set by the shareholders at the AGMs to meet the ongoing road maintenance programme. We are grateful to the vast majority of residents who pay the annual fee in full; it is most regrettable that a small minority are not so community spirited.

The roads were originally built of concrete, now layered with tarmac. They were not designed for the high volume of vehicles nor the large number of heavy trucks we see today. This high usage inevitably leads to a higher degree of wear and tear and potentially could adversely impact the underlying sub-structure. The company has therefore introduced a build levy which seeks additional one-off contributions from households undertaking significant development works.

Estate residents are encouraged to become shareholders in EDDR, over 40% are already. Shareholders who have fully paid current and past annual fees are entitled to vote at the AGMs. To become a member (there's no charge), please email us.

The company has three directors - Robert Corbett (Chair), Brian Howe (Ops) and Stewart Fuller (Co. Secretary), and we are supported by an Administrator – Caraline Marchant. We need more support, please. Stewart is standing down at the AGM in March 2026 and we are looking for someone to take his place. If you're interested in the position of Director and/or Co. Secretary, or would like to help out in any other way, please email us and we'll arrange a chat.

Finally, emails are a quick and easy way to communicate with you. We hold email addresses for over 70% of households on the Estate on our secure database. This allows us to send global emails or target specific roads. If we don't hold your email address and you would like us to communicate with you via email, please let us know. East Dean & Friston Village Show

Did you know that there has been a Flower Show in the Village from 1907 until the start of the First World War? Restarted in 1947 by the Cricket Club as a fund-raising event to be held on August Bank Holiday Monday in conjunction with a cricket match.

78 years later the Flower Show is organised by a stand-alone committee dedicated to running the Show for the enjoyment of the village. The committee raises funds to run the show via seeking sponsorship from local businesses, selling advertising in the Schedule and on the day admission charges and selling afternoon teas with home baked cakes and scones.

Other than the children's classes which are open to all children and grandchildren who have a relative living in the village, entries are restricted to residents only from East Dean & Friston.

There were 80 entries in 1947 and last year we had 140 entries – we have over 100 different classes including vegetables, flowers, fruit, baking, preserves, pot plants, flower arranging, needlework, crafts and photographs. All judged to RHS rules by qualified RHS judges. In total there are 23 trophies to be won, all having been given by local villagers, past and present. We look forward to welcoming you to the Show on August Bank Holiday Monday 2025 or even better, why not enter one or more of the classes?

East Dean Greensward Limited

East Dean Greensward Limited (EDGL) is a Company Limited by Guarantee with a single asset – The Greensward on the Downlands Estate – but no shareholders, only members. The purpose of EDGL is to ensure the continuing amenity value of the Greensward for the enjoyment of all residents and to protect it against future development. Any householder in the parish can become a member of EDGL at no cost.

In 2023 EDGL introduced a native wildflower meadow at the southern end of the Greensward with the aim of bringing summer colour to the area and more pollinator-friendly flowers. An interpretive board was added to inform residents about the initiative. This year the area has been extended with a more natural boundary and resown. We hope for a similar bright display.

After much public support, we are continuing to use part of the upper end of the Greensward as a no-mow area to give wildflower species already present a chance to flower and reseed. There is no fence or any restriction on access. Such species as cowslip, dog violet and pyramidal orchid are now increasing in number. The area will be left unmown for the spring and summer before an autumn tidy-up.

Some additional native tree species were planted last year at the southern end. In addition, replacements for trees that have died are made, often sponsored by a resident.

During consultations for the Parish Neighbourhood Plan, many residents expressed their wish for greater public use of local greenspaces, for recreation and amenity as well as for their wildlife value. The EDGL Board is now looking at options for the Greensward, including two picnic benches and perhaps a few social events in addition to the Annual Village Fete. Further ideas and suggestions are always welcome.

Chair's report 2025

It is that time again where, as Chair, I get to reflect on what the year has held and the significant things that have happened.

We are really fortunate that our committee remains strong and totally committed to working for the benefit of our community.

Last year we focused on publicity in an attempt to attract more members, and to share with current members what we have been up to on their behalf. We hope that you have visited our excellent website, **edfra.org.uk**, and have enjoyed reading the biannual Newsletter. I am delighted to say that membership has increased by nearly 12 percent over the last year.

The weather was good in July and 2024's fete was a resounding success, with many residents commenting that it was the best ever! We raised money for the community and have purchased two new oak benches. Having asked residents for their ideas we have located one on the Link and one will soon be located near to the Village Hall.

The start of this year has been an extremely busy one. The RA committee organised a Burns Night Extravaganza and with help of family and friends laid on a full three course meal and entertainment for 84 or our residents. It was a fabulous evening and with your generosity we managed to present the charity **Coats 4 Kids** a cheque for £500.

February continued our events schedule and local band Duality entertained us for a lovely evening of music and dance. It was a great way to dispel those winter blues and great value for members who received a £5 discount per ticket.

Profits from our events are put back into the community. We will continue with the initiative to allocate £2000 this coming year in support of the local village clubs and organisations. Over the past 12 months we have supported the Greensward wildflower project, the Open Art exhibition, the Parish Magazine and the Village Hall Trust. Alongside this we have purchased traffic mirrors and PIR lights to help with safety around the village and funded educational events around environmental issues.

Over the years we have always tried to ensure that our membership fee is great value for money, indeed we have not put up the cost of membership for some time now. At last year's AGM we voted to raise the subscription fees. However, we are currently financially secure and in light of the ever-increasing cost of living we have decided to keep the fees the same for one more year.

After much work the East Dean & Friston Neighbourhood Plan has now been submitted to the South Downs National Park Authority (March 2025). Officers there will check that all the

necessary documents are in place, and then put it out for a second public consultation, perhaps in late summer. The Residents' Association have played a large role in keeping residents updated with current information via emails and the RA website.

I hope you have benefitted in some way from all the hard work that goes into running what is **your** Residents' Association. I would like to say a massive thank you on behalf of us all, and from me personally, to all our members without whose support there would be no EDFRA.
